

Bangladesh Stops March

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**Around
The World**

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NEW DELHI—Bangladesh and India sealed their common border to prevent a planned march by more than 50,000 Bihari Moslems from Bangladesh across India to their homeland in Pakistan, officials said here.

The Bihari Moslems who planned to march are among some 280,000 non-Benghalis who chose to retain Pakistani citizenship when the East Province of Pakistan became independent Bangladesh in 1971. They threatened to make the 1,500-mile march across

India to force their repatriation to Pakistan.

Mrs. Bhutto Ends Mourning

KARACHI, Pakistan—The widow of executed prime minister Zulfiqar Ali Bhutto emerged from four months of mourning to denounce Pakistan's military rulers and assert claim to leadership of her husband's Pakistan People's Party.

Begum Nusrat Bhutto's reappearance on the political scene is certain to worry the military government, which has promised to hold elections in November. She charged that the military rule had resulted in the worst repression in the nation's history. She said she was convinced that

her husband did not die by hanging, as officials stated after his execution April 4.

S. Korea to Free 871

SEOUL—South Korean officials announced 53 persons imprisoned for political dissent will be freed today. The government also will release 818 criminal convicts to commemorate the 35th anniversary of Korea's liberation from Japanese colonial rule, officials said.

Meanwhile, the U.S. government condemned what it called "excessive and brutal action by the Korean national police" in a raid on opposition party headquarters in which one woman died and scores were injured.

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
